

The following is a template for students wishing to pursue a combined undergraduate degree in economics along with a Master of Accountancy (MAcc). This template is only an example of how a student might wish to accomplish earning a Bachelor of Science in Economics and a MAcc in 5 years. However, if a student wishes to pursue a Bachelor of Arts in Economics, this template can be modified with the help of an economics advisor. In addition, the Master of Accountancy is 30 credit hours and is expected to be completed during the 5th year of study. Students should contact the Master of Accountancy Director in order to plan a program of study.

*ECON 521 (Intermediate Microeconomic Theory, which is Intermediate Microeconomics with calculus required) is offered each fall but typically is not offered in the spring. It is certainly fine to take ECON 520 or 521 in semester III and ECON 510 in semester four. The science courses with labs are simply recommendations and may be substituted.

**For the economics electives II and III we recommend considering Managerial Economics (ECON 540, offered each semester) and Public Finance (ECON 633, offered each spring) if they wish to take ECON 684 during semester IX. A student may need to take either International Economics (681) or Development Economics (682) to fulfill their international overlay requirement if they choose to take ECON 633 instead of ECON 684.
